Dear Friends,

Memory and our ability to remember is amazingly complex. It is incredible isn't it how a smell, a song, a picture, or even a single word, like a name, can trigger experiences, places, and people from our past? Just think of the sound of an alarm, a red poppy, or freshly cut grass! With such memories come a whole host of feelings and thoughts.

November, linked to so many occasions to remember, can be a bit of an emotional and thought-provoking roller coaster of a month. There's All Saints, on the 1st November, remembering people of faith from the past, All Souls, on the 2nd November, remembering loved ones who have died and Remembrance Sunday, this year on the 10th, remembering the sacrifice and suffering of so many people in past wars and ongoing conflicts. In addition to these dates, we have communal events such as Bonfire Night and many people will also be remembering times of individual and personal significance, such as birthdays, or anniversaries.



All of these occasions involve remembering consciously, or unconsciously, people, events, and experiences from the past and present. These contribute to our sense of identity as individuals, as communities and as a nation.

The world religions are big on remembering. Religious faith of all kinds, is based on remembering that there is something more to life than just this life. For Christians our whole Church year, not just November, is punctuated with festivals and services that encourage us to remember in a particular way, for example, the birth, life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Every time we celebrate Holy Communion, the Eucharist, for example, we remember Jesus' words:

Do this in remembrance of me ...

We are encouraged to remember, lest we forget, because remembering can influence our emotions, thoughts, and actions in the present and how we will act in the future. For example, on Remembrance Sunday we remember the cost of war, hopefully, to try and work harder for peace in the future and to help those who still suffer.

This November let us value the preciousness of being able to remember, the communal power of remembering and the opportunity to learn and change because we remember.

Remembering wars and conflicts across the world:

News from the Parish ...

Gift Day Sunday 24th November 2024

On the forthcoming Gift Day, we will seek to raise enough income to secure the work of the Parish in the coming year and see the Christian life of our churches thrive.



It is the responsibility of the Parish, of us all, to generate the income to cover the diocesan share which directly pays for our clergy. Ensuring we have the funds to fulfil this commitment is the focus of our fundraising call for this Gift Day.

Firstly, would you prayerfully review your regular giving to the church. This is a personal matter and each person's means will be different to the next, but the biblical principle of tithing is a good guide. The recent Church of England report 'Stewardship- Generosity Report' defines the tithe as giving 10% of monthly income after tax to charitable causes, which includes the church. The easiest way to give to the church is through the Parish Giving Scheme. There is information available in our churches and from the parish office, and help is available if you need it.

Secondly, please consider leaving a legacy to Wareham Parish in your Will Leaving a legacy, large or small, will help us to continue our Christian mission and enable the people of Wareham Parish to worship and be supported by our five Churches long into the future. Having a will means you can determine exactly what you want to happen to your estate, and this could include a gift to the Church. Do remember that there may be tax benefits arising from gifts to charity. If you already have a will, it is possible to use a device called a 'codicil' to make a small change, without needing a new will.

A leaflet is available in our churches which explains how you can make a will. Thank you all for supporting God's work in our parish.






Living Through Bereavement – With the Help of Christian Thought And Prayer By David M. Owen, SPCK 10.99



All of us are confronted by death at various times in our lives. Some bereavements are particularly devastating – we may have been very close to the one who has died, or death has come suddenly, unnaturally or even violently.

This anthology of quotations is divided into two sections. The first contains material on the Bible's teaching on life after death; the concept of the soul; the need to face the truth of our own mortality; living to the full; untimely death; suicide; death as the result of disaster and of war. The second focuses on solace in grief; the comfort of Christ; our hope of life in heaven; being reunited with those we love, and the great communion of saints.


My Big Story Bible: The First Christmas By Tom Wright, SPCK £9.99

Forgotten Warrior – The Life and Times of Major-General Merton Beckwith-Smith 1890-1942 By Michael Snape, SPCK £19.99



This is a biography of the most senior English soldier to die in a prisoner of war camp during the Second World War, revealing the courage, faith and fortitude of an unjustly forgotten hero of the British army.


Major-General Merton Beckwith-Smith DSO, MC commanded the British 18th Division during the catastrophic Fall of Singapore in February 1942. A much-decorated veteran of the First World War, he was captured along with tens of thousands of other soldiers – British,

Indian, Australian, and Malay – who were then held prisoner on Singapore Island.

Amidst hunger, disease and widespread despair in Changi, over the next six months he rallied the spirits of his soldiers, created a make-shift university and theatre, and helped to inspire a remarkable renewal of collective church life. At the same time, he improved conditions for hospital patients and encouraged sports and other recreations.

While the fate of many of the men he led was to die on the infamous Burma Railway, Beckwith-Smith was exiled to Karenko Camp, Formosa (present-day Taiwan), where, mistreated and malnourished, he died of diphtheria and heart failure on 11 November 1942.
